THE YEAR 2014

The Trinidad and Tobago Olympic Committee (TTOC) facilitated several events in 2014. The usual annual events such as the Sport Administration Course, Olympic Day, Youth Camp followed with the inclusion of three (3) International Games: XX Commonwealth Games in Glasgow, Nanjing Youth Olympic Games and XXII CAC Games in Veracruz.

In commemoration of the Commonwealth Nations, the TTOC partnered with the British Council to host the Queen's Baton Relay in Trinidad and Tobago before the Glasgow Commonwealth Games. A delegation of athletes, cyclists and motorcyclists took to the streets of Trinidad and Tobago carrying the Baton to celebrate the union of all Commonwealth Nations.

Team TTO captured medals in each International Games in 2014. Receiving two (2) Gold medals at the XXII CAC Games in athletics and swimming. These medals were won by Cleopatra Borrel and George Bovel III. At the Glasgow Commonwealth Games, the team earned 8 medals in both athletics and boxing respectfully. Additionally, Team TTO represented at the 2nd Youth Olympic Games in which a Gold and two (2) silver medals were won.

At the Annual Awards TTOC's President, Mr. Lewis launched the 10 or more Olympic Medals by the year 2024 (10Golds24) Athlete Welfare and Preparation campaign, which marked a significant moment for the TTOC. The 10Golds24 journey aims to cultivate a system of excellence that will clarify the development pathway and performance management system that will holistically foster, mentor, nurture and develop Olympians and Olympic Champions.

OLYMPIC DAY

23rd June 2014 (Trinidad Schools)

26th June 2014 (Tobago Schools)

On 23rd June, 2014 over four million people across the world – young and old – participated in various sporting activities, exhibitions, music and educational seminars to commemorate the founding of the modern Olympic Movement on the same day in 1849.

The TTOC aims to keep the tradition of the Olympic Movement alive by hosting our annual Olympic Day event. On Olympic Day, the Lord Harris Square and Olympic House are transformed into an Olympic hub where schools and athletes are invited to celebrate by deploying sports, cultural and educational activities. A number of athletes participated including Olympic Gold Medallist Keshorn Walcott.

The target audience was children between the ages 8 to 14 years old. The theme of Olympic days all around the world is **“Move, Learn and Discover”**.

Move. Sporting Activities were organized as part of a circuit with groups partaking in each activity for ten (10) minutes. These activities included: Skipping rope, Hopscotch, May-I, Red Light Green Light, Marble Pitch, Footsie, Draughts/Checkers and Volleyball.

Discover. With 2014 being the year of the Youth Olympics in Nanjing, China, participants were welcomed with the Chinese Martial art Tai Chi.

The event would not have been a success without the volunteers who coordinated the movement of participants during the day.

The Queen's Baton Relay March 11th – 14th 2014

The Queen's Baton Relay is a much loved tradition of the Commonwealth Games, and symbolizes the coming together of all Commonwealth nations and territories in preparation for the quadrennial festival of sport and culture.

On March 11th 2014, the Baton arrived in Trinidad and Tobago where a press briefing was held at the Olympic House followed by a welcome reception at the Office of the British High Commission. The Trinidad and Tobago Commonwealth Games Association (TTCGA) worked in collaboration with the British Council, the British High Commission and the Tobago House of Assembly to celebrate its brief stay.

On March 12th, the delegation received greetings from the former National footballer, Dwight Yorke at the A.N.R Robinson International Airport in Tobago. Local athletes, motorcycle riders and cyclists took off across the island cheering the baton with the accompaniment of music and dancing.

The relay continued in Trinidad on March 13th starting at the St. Joseph Secondary School with a formal opening. Trinidad and Tobago's First Lady, Her Excellency Reema Carmona was the first baton carrier. The relay proceeded along the Eastern Main Road with participation of past Commonwealth Games Medallists, Glasgow 2014 athletes and Trinidad and Tobago's Olympic and Paralympic Torch bearers.

A large gathering of students and athletes were present at the Hasely Crawford Stadium for the Secondary School Track and Field Championships where the relay concluded, with a final run by the British High Commissioner Arthur Snell and a hand over to the President of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago.

Olympic Youth Camp - 7th to 12th July (Tobago) 21st to 26th July (Trinidad)

The Olympic Youth Camp is an annual initiative of the TTOC with the aim of developing all round sport leaders by targeting our top national junior athletes. The camp is structured around the Olympic Principles – *Pursuit of Excellence, Balance between Body, Mind and Will, Fair Play, Joy of Effort and Respect for Others.*

The Olympic Youth Camp took place over six days at two locations. Forty-eight (48) participants in total were given the opportunity to be educated and empowered. The objectives of the camp were as follows:

- To inform participants about the fundamental principles of Olympism
- To provide a forum for exposure to Olympic Education, Culture and Art
- To raise the level of awareness among the campers of the role of sport in self-development
- To strengthen the leadership and communication skills of future national athletes
- To provide an opportunity for fun and interaction through an Olympic Experience

From the period 7th to 12th July 2014, Shaw Park Facility in Tobago was utilized as the Olympic Youth Camp. The TTOC worked in conjunction with the Tobago House Assembly (THA) to facilitate the camp in Tobago.

GAMES AND RESULTS

Youth Olympic Games (YOG) Nanjing, China 16th – 28th August 2014.

The Second Edition of the Youth Olympic Games was held in Nanjing, China from the 16th – 28th August 2014. The delegation comprised of 11 athletes and 6 officials whom represented in 4 sports. The delegation consisted of athletes between the ages of 14 - 18 years old.

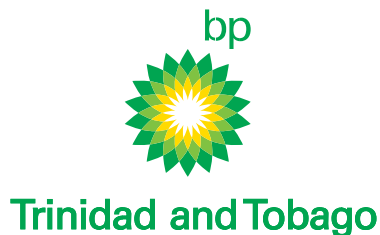
